The transformation from domestic goddess to outdoor adventurer was physically and emotionally demanding, but unbelievably rewarding for Christina Simmons.

"I'm a domestic princess," Simmons said, smiling. "So, having to limit the clothing I pack and not washing my hair every day was tough, but if I can live out of a backpack for six days, there's no telling what I can do."

Simmons, 56, recently completed a 51.6-mile section hike of the Appalachian Trail.

"It was so empowering,' the Beavercreek woman said. "You meet so many incredible people and they all have their goals and their success stories."

Simmons' success story includes coming back from two ACL surgeries - most recently in 2015.

"I basically had to learn to walk again," she said.

She stumbled upon the Dayton Hikers by accident while talking with some paddlers she knew and the rest is history as she has been enjoying the trails and the challenge of hiking ever since.

"Our ladies-only trips are very popular," said Andy Niekamp of the Outdoor Adventure Connection. "Women tend to be much more social than men and wish to be out in nature with like-minded ladies. They feel less intimidated without men around as men often take charge on adventure outings."

Candy Arndts, of New Carlisle, has loved the great outdoors for as long as she can

"When I was 10 years old, my grandma lived in Kentucky and when I'd go visit her, I'd climb up the hills and just go walking all day," she said. "I iust loved to go hiking."

That love hasn't diminished in the more than five decades that followed as Arndts, now 64, has hiked more than 100 miles of the Appalachian Trail and has her sights set on another section hike soon. She occasionally leads hikes with the Dayton Hikers and shares her passion for all things outdoors

with her sons and six grandchildren.

"I just want to be outdoors as much as I can," she said. "I feel better and I sleep better, even if I get out and walk for just an hour. And I have met such wonderful women."

Fall - with its vivid, colorful display - is among her favorite times to take to the trails.

"In fall, I'm just in awe of all of God's beauty," she said.

That is another difference Niekamp has observed between men and women.

"Women are more likely to immerse themselves in nature, where men have a tendency to want to conquer nature," he said.

Arndt's advice to reluctant outdoor adventurers is simple.

"Just try it, even just a short hike," she said. "It doesn't have to be fast, just one step at a time. Breathe in that fresh air and you'll want to be back."
